#### Hancock County Genealogical Society Minutes 10 August 2019

The August 10, 2019 meeting of the Hancock County Genealogical Society was convened at the Chamberlain House, home of the Ellsworth Historical Society. President Ralph Harris called the meeting to order at 10:14 am. Five members were in attendance.

Minutes of the July meeting were read and approved.

Membership remains the same.

Max Brenninkmeyer reported interest of \$ .03 with no other transactions for the month. The 31 July 2019 balance was \$3,213.85. The report was accepted. Max turned over the records from his term as treasurer. He suggested having a second officer who could sign checks. Emery DeBeck nominated Charlene Clemons to fill that role. The vote was unanimous to give her that authority. She will write a letter, which Ralph Harris will sign to take to Camden National Bank. Max also suggested that the bills for hosting our website be sent to Wayne Smith and he can forward them to Jean Boynton in her role as treasurer to pay them. The last item was the filing of the yearly fee for State Corporation. That job will be handled by the secretary.

Under old business, the publishing of the Ellsworth American Index currently being worked on and proof-read was discussed. A "print on demand" publication with us ordering 25 copies for sale was suggested. This would alleviate the problem of storing a larger number of books that might or might not sell.

Charlene talked about a possible author visit in October; details to be confirmed in September.

There will be no meeting in September due to the conflict with the Maine Genealogical Meeting in Portland. The next meeting will be Saturday, October 12<sup>th</sup> at the Ellsworth Library.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:35 am, after which, Max Brenninkmeyer gave a program on the Bellatty family of Ellsworth.

At the end of Max's talk we bid a fond farewell to Max and Ruth Brenninkmeyer who are leaving the area in October.

### Hancock County Genealogical Society Minutes 12 October 2019

The October 2019 meeting of the Hancock County Genealogical Society was held on Saturday the 12<sup>th</sup> in the Riverview Room of the Ellsworth Public Library.

The meeting began with an interesting talk by author Carol Gardner. Ms. Gardner spoke about her ancestor, Thomas Doughty, one of the Scottish prisoners captured after the Battle of Dunbar, transported to America, and sold as indentured servants. Thomas Doughty's story is the basis for her book, "The Involuntary Americans" copies of which were available for sale after the talk and slide show.

After Ms. Gardner's program, President Ralph Harris called a brief business meeting to order. Minutes of the August meeting were read and approved. There was no Treasurer's report, due to the transition from Max to Jean as treasurer.

The only old business was a quick update on the index of Ellsworth American deaths Wayne and Ralph are working on. Still working on it. A brief discussion of the September Maine Genealogical Society meeting in Portland followed.

Under new business, Charlene asked the group to consider making a donation to the Hancock Historical Society Building fund in memory of HCGS Life Member, Lois Johnson, for whom the museum is named. A donation of \$500.00 was approved.


The November meeting will be the annual meeting and election of officers. Membership cards for 2020 are in and dues will be accepted at any time.


