President's Corner

Hoping all is well with our membership.

We will be ending the year and starting a new year shortly. The HCGS will try to host a speaker every quarter this year. One speaker is scheduled for the March 2022 meeting and will be speaking on the holdings of the Bar Harbor Trust, and how their historical holdings can help a genealogist.

If you are not a member of our Facebook site, you should be. I have been posting several new websites that have come online in the past year as I receive them.

FamilySearch has posted several new digital files from Maine. They're only available on film, and have not been indexed yet. As of November, they had three digital cameras working in Maine uploading new files to FamilySearch.

One of our projects here at HCGS is the transcription of Hancock County deaths from the handwritten records made by the editors of the *Ellsworth American*. Wayne Smith is still typing from the ledgers and I have been the second set of eyes on the project for typos. Wayne has done an awesome job transcribing the records. I don't know how many names there are so far but it must be well into the thousands.

Another project, which I have been working on this summer and have almost completed, is the Funeral Home Records of the Edward Funeral Home in Madison, Somerset County. These ledgers date from 1901 to 1985 and have around 7,500 deaths in the area. The transcribed records will be sent to the proofreader next week, and will be available in May of 2022.

RULES FOR TEACHERS

1872

- 1. Teachers each day will fill lamps and clean chimneys
- 2. Each teacher will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the day's session.
- 3. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of the pupils.
- 4. Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly
- 5. After ten hours in school, teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
- 6. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
- 7. Every teacher should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.
- 8. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, intention, integrity and honesty.
- 9. The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay, providing the Board of Education approves.

I come from a long line of teachers, a profession I had no interest in following. Two aunts, my grandmother, and her three sisters taught in Hancock County between the late 1800s and the 1960s when the last one retired after 40 years in the same school in Orland, Maine. This would have been too early for them, but my great grandmother, Susan Saunders Stover (known as Toot), who lived from 1840 to 1913, would have been teaching at this time. The day the Superintendent of Schools came to the house to tell her she had been hired to teach, the story goes, she was in the attic playing on the swing with the other children. With no formal training she began teaching children who were probably very close to her own age. She would have worked under these rules until she married her husband Harvey Jackson Cunningham in 1875 when, according to rule number six, she would have been dismissed.
